Proposed Budget Below Tax Levy Cap

Maintains Programs and Services

Residents within the district will head to the polls on Tuesday, May 17, to vote on the proposed spending plan for the 2022-23 school year. The proposed budget represents a tax levy increase of 2.9%, which is below the district's allowable tax levy cap of 3.4% for the upcoming year. While below the tax cap, the proposed spending plan allows the district to provide our students the outstanding programs and services they deserve.

The budget supports the district's continued focus on academic priorities and diverse course offerings to maximize student achievement and provides additional sections and electives in certain areas. The proposed spending plan also supports the district's ongoing efforts in student wellness as we continue to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic. Los residentes del distrito acudirán a las urnas el martes 17 de mayo para votar sobre el plan de gastos propuesto para el año escolar 2022-23. El presupuesto propuesto representa un aumento de la recaudación de impuestos del 2,9 %, que está por debajo del límite de recaudación de impuestos permitido del distrito del 3,4 % para el próximo año. Si bien se encuentra por debajo del tope impositivo, el plan de gastos propuesto permite que el distrito brinde a nuestros estudiantes los programas y servicios sobresalientes que se merecen.

ELWOOD Points of Pride

- Elwood Middle School was recognized as a School to Watch by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform.
- Three high school seniors were named Commended Students in the 2022 National Merit Scholarship Program, and one was named a Finalist.
- Elwood John H. Glenn High School scored in the top 10% statewide in student achievement on Advanced Placement college-level coursework and exams.
- A total of 70 high-achieving high school seniors earned summa cum laude (weighted GPA between 96.50 and 100), magna cum laude (weighted GPA between 95 and 96.49) or cum laude (weighted GPA between 94 and 94.99) designation.
- Two high school student-musicians were selected by the New York State School Music Association to perform at the 2021 All-State Music Conference, and

two additional students were selected as alternates.

- Elwood Middle School's Science Olympiad team earned two medals in the regional competition.
- Four high school seniors were honored with selection to the Art League of Long Island's 15th annual Go APE Advanced Placement Exhibition.
- A high school freshman was honored with All-County selection to the Suffolk County Music Educators' Association Vocal Jazz Ensemble.
- Ten selected high school juniors and seniors participated in the first of a series of Social Justice Ambassador workshops offered by the Huntington Anti-Bias Task Force and Suffolk Y JCC.
- Numerous student-musicians from the middle school and Boyd were selected for Suffolk County Music Educators' Association All-County Division I, II and III ensembles.



- Elwood Middle School students helped create and run a food pantry to support monthly food donations for 10 local families.
- A high school senior's work was chosen for exhibition in the 2021 Long Island Artists Exhibition at the Art League of Long Island.
- Elwood students from all four schools recognized in the 50th annual PTA Reflections art program included 14 winners and 10 honorable mentions.




2022-2023 Proposed Budget (Presupuesto propuesto para 2022-2023)

As demonstrated in the above chart, the majority of the proposed budget (72.5%) goes toward program costs.

(Como se demuestra en el cuadro anterior, la mayor parte del presupuesto propuesto (72,5%) se destina a los costos del programa.)



Questions and Answers

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Q: What percentage of voters needs to approve the budget for it to pass?

A: Elwood's proposed budget represents a tax levy increase of 2.9%, which is below the district's tax levy cap. A simple majority of voters is needed to approve the plan.

Q: Since the proposed budget represents a tax levy increase of 2.9%, does that mean my taxes will only increase by this amount if the plan is approved by voters?

A: No. If the budget is approved, the amount that the Elwood School District can collect in property taxes to operate for the 2022-23 school year is capped at 2.9% (this is referred to as the tax levy). Individual tax bills may differ, based on a variety of factors, including the taxable value of each individual property as determined by the Town of Huntington.

Q: What if the budget is defeated?

A: If the proposed budget for 2022-23 is defeated at the polls on May 17, state law allows the school board two options: The Board can either present the same budget or a revised budget to voters for a second vote in mid-June, or it can vote to adopt a contingency budget. If the budget is defeated a second time, the district must adopt a contingency budget, per New York State law.

Q: Where can I find more information on the proposed budget?

A: All budget presentations and supporting documents can be found on the district's website, www.elwood.k12.ny.us. All residents are also invited to attend the budget hearing scheduled for Tuesday, May 10, at 7:30 p.m. at Elwood Middle School.



Preguntas y respuestas



P: ¿Qué porcentaje de votantes necesita aprobar el presupuesto para que se apruebe?

R: El presupuesto propuesto por Elwood representa un aumento de la recaudación de impuestos del 2.9%, que está dentro del límite de recaudación de impuestos del distrito. Se necesita una mayoría simple de votantes para aprobar el plan.

P: Dado que el presupuesto propuesto representa un aumento de la recaudación de impuestos del 2.9%, ¿significa eso que mis impuestos solo aumentarán en esta cantidad si el plan es aprobado por los votantes?

R: No. Si se aprueba el presupuesto, la cantidad que el Distrito Escolar de Elwood puede recaudar en impuestos a la propiedad para operar durante el año escolar 2022-23 tiene un tope de 2.9% (esto se conoce como el gravamen de impuestos). Las facturas de impuestos individuales pueden diferir, en función de una variedad de factores, incluido el valor imponible de cada propiedad individual según lo determine el Pueblo de Huntington.

P: ¿Qué pasa si se derrota el presupuesto?

R: Si el presupuesto propuesto para 2022-23 es rechazado en las urnas el 17 de Mayo, la ley estatal permite a la junta escolar dos opciones: la junta puede presentar el mismo presupuesto o un presupuesto revisado a los votantes para

una segunda votación a mediados de junio., o puede votar para adoptar un presupuesto de contingencia. Si el presupuesto es rechazado por segunda vez, el distrito debe adoptar un presupuesto de contingencia, según la ley del estado de Nueva York.

P: ¿Dónde puedo encontrar más información sobre el presupuesto propuesto?

R: Todas las presentaciones presupuestarias y los documentos de respaldo se pueden encontrar en el sitio web del distrito, www.elwood.k12.ny.us. Todos los residentes también están invitados a asistir a la audiencia presupuestaria programada para el jueves 10 de Mayo a las 7:30 p.m. en la Escuela Intermedia Elwood.

VOTING INFORMATION

Registration

Only registered voters can participate in the election on Tuesday, May 17. If you have voted in school or general elections during the past four years, you are already registered and eligible to vote this May. Residents may register to vote in the District Clerk's office, located in the Elwood Middle School at 100 Kenneth Ave., Greenlawn, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. any day school is in session, up to five days before the annual election.

Voter Qualifications

Under New York State Education Law, you are eligible to vote in school elections if you are a United States citizen, you are 18 years of age or older, you are a resident of the district for a period of 30 days before the date of the vote, and:

- You are registered with the Suffolk County Board of Elections with an address located within the geographical boundaries of the Elwood School District, or
- You are registered with the school district and have voted in a district election within the past four years, or
- You register through May 12 with the school district in the manner set forth above.

Voter registration forms can be obtained from the Suffolk County Board of Elections, post office, public library or the District Clerk's office. Forms can also be downloaded from the New York State Board of Elections website at www.elections.ny.gov.

Absentee Ballots

Absentee ballot applications must be received by the District Clerk not more than thirty (30) and at least seven (7) days prior to the election and vote, if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election and vote if the ballot is to be personally picked up by the voter or the voter's designated agent set forth on the application. Qualified voters for the May 17, 2022, annual election and budget vote can now apply for an absentee ballot based on the risk of contracting COVID-19 by checking the box on the application that states "Temporary illness or physical disability." Absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on the day of the election and vote, May 17, 2022.

If you need an absentee ballot, you can pick up an application in the District Office located within Elwood Middle School, or call the District Clerk, Mary Lou Marx, at (631) 266-5400, ext. 1402.

INFORMACIÓN DE VOTACIÓN

Registración

Solamente votantes registrados pueden participar en la elección el día martes, 17 de mayo. Si usted ha votado en el colegio o en la elección general durante los últimos cuatro años, usted ya está registrado y es elegible para votar este mayo. Residentes pueden registrarse para votar en la oficina del Secretario/a del Distrito, localizada en el Colegio Intermedio de Elwood en 100 Kenneth Avenue, Greenlawn, entre las horas de las 9 a.m. y las 3 p.m. cualquier día que el colegio esté en sesión, hasta cinco días antes de la elección anual.

Cualificaciones de los Votantes

Bajo la Ley del Estado de Nueva York, usted es elegible a votar en las elecciones escolares si usted es un ciudadano de los Estados Unidos, tiene 18 años a más de edad, es residente del distrito por un período de 30 días antes de la fecha de votación, y:

- Esta actualmente registrado con la Junta de Elecciones del Condado de Suffolk con una dirección localizada entre los límites geográficos del Distrito Escolar de Elwood, o
- Esta registrado con el distrito escolar y ha votado en la elección del distrito dentro de los últimos cuatro años, o
- Esta registrado mediante el distrito escolar para el 12 de mayo de la manera descrita arriba.

Las formas para la registración a votar se pueden obtener en la Junta de Elecciones del Condado de Suffolk, correo postal, biblioteca pública o en la oficina del Secretario/a del Distrito. Las formas también se pueden bajar de la página web de la Junta de Elecciones del Estado de Nueva York en www.elections.ny.gov.

Papeletas en Ausencia

Las solicitudes de boleta de votante ausente deben ser recibidas por el secretario de distrito no más de treinta (30) y al menos siete (7) días antes de la elección y la votación, si la boleta debe enviarse por correo al votante, o el día antes de la elección y voto si la boleta debe ser recogida personalmente por el votante o el agente designado por el votante establecido en la solicitud. Los votantes calificados para la elección anual del 17 de mayo de 2022 y la votación presupuestaria ahora pueden solicitar una boleta de voto en ausencia en función del riesgo de contraer COVID-19 marcando la casilla en la solicitud que dice "Enfermedad temporal o discapacidad física." El secretario de distrito debe recibir las boletas de voto en ausencia a más tardar a las 5 p.m. el día de la elección y votación, 17 de mayo de 2022.

Si necesita una boleta de voto en ausencia, puede recoger una solicitud en la oficina del distrito ubicada dentro de la escuela secundaria Elwood, o llamar a la secretaría del distrito, Mary Lou Marx, al (631) 266-5400 Ext. 1402.

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

The recently approved regulations recognize the importance of engaging students' interests in rigorous and relevant academic programs in the Arts; Languages other than English (LOTE)/Biliteracy; Career and Technical Education (CTE); Humanities; Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM); and Career Developmental Occupational Studies (CDOS). The revised regulation allows students to use a passing score on an approved pathway assessment or successful completion of program requirements for the CDOS credential toward meeting the assessment requirements for graduation.






ENROLLMENT BY ETHNICITY
